THINGS TO SEE AND DO IN THE PRINCIPALITY FOR ALL THE FAMILY

Take a stroll through the gardens

The Principality is surprisingly green and verdant, and in fact a fifth of the entire country is covered by <u>parks and gardens</u>, many of them open to the public, providing the perfect place for a little relaxing family time.

From Larvotto to Fontvieille, and from Monaco-Ville to the Exotic Garden, there's always a tranquil green space nearby, for a welcome breath of fresh air as you stroll among the trees and plants.

Starting with the <u>Japanese Garden</u>. Created in 1994 on the wishes of Prince Rainier III, this beautiful garden in the Larvotto district is a place of total peacefulness and serenity. A quiet little corner of the Land of the Rising Sun, right here in the Principality.

A Principality that has recently expanded its total area by about 3%, with the inauguration of <u>Mareterra</u>. Six additional hectares to visit with the family. The main attractions of this new area include a Prince Jacques Promenade along the seafront with a unique mineral atmosphere, a blue cave that will allow the curious a glimpse into the internal workings of the new structure, a relaxation space conductive to meditation, gardens, as well as the Quai du Petit Portier and its marina.

Take a walk through the <u>Casino Gardens</u> and see the kids marvel at the huge trees in the Jardins de la Petite Afrique or "Little Africa Gardens", named for the tropical species that grow there.

Fancy a stroll through some glorious gardens overlooking the Mediterranean? Make for the <u>Saint Martin Gardens</u> in Monaco's Old Town district, and admire the gorgeous greenery against a backdrop of stunning blue. These gardens were originally typically Mediterranean, but as you make your way among the plants, look out for some of the surprisingly exotic species planted here over the years. And of course, enjoy the sweeping sea views.

Tucked away at the foot of the Rock of Monaco itself, you'll find the <u>Rainier III Zoological Gardens</u>, named in tribute to the animal-loving Prince. The zoo sits on the cliffside overlooking the Port of Fontvieille, and is home to some 250 animals, all of which were donated, abandoned, seized by customs, or exchanged with other zoos. It's the perfect family day out! Please note that the site is currently closed for safety reasons due to ongoing work on the cliff face.

Continue your stroll with a visit to <u>Fontvieille landscaped gardens</u>, around the big top where the Monte-Carlo International Circus Festival takes place every year. The large gardens are popular with families and locals, as is the nearby Princess Grace Rose Garden with its countless varieties of roses. And don't be surprised if you should happen to meet other families along the way - feathered ones, that is - as ducks and geese are free to roam the park!

Up in the Exotic Garden district on the heights above the Principality, you'll find <u>Princess Antoinette Park.</u> The children's play area, surrounded by olive trees, has amusements for little ones up to the age of 9. There's also a mini-golf course and a miniature farm that's always a big hit with younger kids. The ewes, ducks, rabbits, and chickens are happy and well cared for by the park's team of gardeners.



Last but most certainly not least, there is the <u>Botanical Centre</u> in the Exotic Garden, with its rows of greenhouses containing the world's largest collections of cacti and succulent plants - more than 10,000 altogether!

Immerse yourself in culture

In Monaco, we celebrate culture. The culture of excellence, for all ages! With world-class cultural institutions, countless prestige events, and a vast array of things going on, there's always something to see and do in the Principality!

Take in a movie under the stars from mid-June to mid-September, the <u>Open Air Cinema</u> in the Monaco-Ville district, just below the Oceanographic Museum, shows movies on a big screen in a truly unique setting with the starry skies above and the Mediterranean Sea below. A cinephile's dream!

World-class music for the whole family! In addition to its usual programme of classical music concerts, the <u>Monte-Carlo Philharmonic Orchestra</u> also regularly performs special concerts for young audiences, aimed at children aged 4 and over. They are a great way to get kids interested in music and offer plenty of variety, with everything from concerts for the whole family, to film screenings, and even musical fairy tales.

Stage left, stage right... The <u>Théâtre Princesse Grâce</u> has all the bases covered with a packed programme that includes numerous plays suitable for younger audiences and families. The eclectic selection of shows means there's something for everyone!

The Principality also has a popular open-air theatre in the Monaco-Ville district, overlooking the Mediterranean Sea. Every summer, <u>Fort Antoine</u>, a historic fortress dating from the early 18th century, is transformed into an outdoor auditorium and hosts all kinds of performances, from drama to comedy and everything in between. Watching a play, by the sea, on a warm evening under the stars... What better way to make unforgettable family memories? Monaco is also home to many outstanding museums and monuments, some of them world-famous.

Facing the sea, the <u>Oceanographic Museum</u>, which opened all the way back in 1910, is the perfect place for youngsters to learn about the marine world, with its thousands of different species of tropical and Mediterranean fish. A day at the museum is a fun and educational experience, with entertaining activities, permanent exhibits, fascinating one-off exhibitions and even the chance to see sea turtles being cared for in specially created tanks.

One of the highlights of your visit to the Oceanographic Museum will be the new permanent exhibition, "The Prince and the Mediterranean", where you can go aboard a reconstruction of Prince Rainier III's personal yacht. The Monaco-Ville landmark has plenty to keep children entertained, with activities like ImmerSEAve 360, an immersive virtual reality experience that allows them to explore the ocean, particularly on weekends and during school holidays. Another fun and educational activity for children is the tactile basin. This fascinating workshop reveals the secrets of the fauna and the flora of the Mediterranean coast.

For another great day out that's sure to be a hit with the kids, head to the <u>Museum of Prehistoric Anthropology</u> and learn all about the fascinating history of evolution. The Museum caters to children of primary and middle school age, and the curators are experts in sharing their passion for their subject with the younger generation. And until 1st December 2025, the Museum presents "The butterfly effect: pre-historic animals": an exhibition that explores the connections between animal species and brings together significant



archaeological collections. Designed to spark curiosity in all, the exhibition offers workshops for children, animated lectures and guided tours, and projection areas.

Take a step back in time with a visit to the <u>Cars Collection of H.S.H. the Prince of Monaco</u>, at Port Hercule. The museum houses around a hundred vehicles once owned by Prince Rainier III, who was a keen automobile enthusiast. The collection is one of the Principality's treasures, and offers visitors the chance to take a journey through history. Kids will be thrilled to see everything from the magnificent 1903 De Dion-Buton, all the way up to the Ferrari Formula 1 car driven by Monaco's very own Charles Leclerc!

It's a classic, something every family has to see at least once when in Monaco: the Changing of the Palace Guard. Every day at 11.55 am on the dot, the solemn, centuries-old ceremony takes place in the square outside the Prince's Palace.

And while you're there, why not take the opportunity to head inside the Palace and explore the <u>State Apartments</u>, which are open to the public between March and October. It's a fascinating journey into history for all the family, with a trove of beautifully-preserved treasures to admire, including 600 m² of newly-restored Renaissance frescoes.

The <u>Casino de Monte-Carlo</u> remains one of the very finest gaming and entertainment venues anywhere in Europe, and indeed the world. With its James Bond atmosphere and Belle Epoque architecture, it would be a shame for the family to miss out on experiencing such a stunning and legendary place. Fortunately, the Casino is open in the morning for tours, and all ages are welcome, as the gaming tables and slot machines are closed at that time of day, leaving the whole family free to admire the gaming lounges, the Atrium, and the Café de la Rotonde. But, of course, this is a highly prestigious establishment, so be sure to dress for the occasion!

Endless sport and leisure activities

If you're an active family, there are plenty of ways to burn off some energy in Monaco! Whether in Fontvieille, Larvotto, or Monaco-Ville, there's no shortage of ideas.

In Monaco-Ville, for example, you'll find not only the Saint-Martin Gardens, the Prince's Palace, the Oceanographic Museum, but also a skate park! A mere stone's throw from the Open Air Cinema, kids aged 8 and over can let off steam as they attempt tricks and jumps with scooters, roller skates, and skateboards. All in a fantastic location overlooking the sea. If that's a little too energetic for your taste, head to Princess Antoinette Park, and enjoy a gentle game of mini-golf or shoot some hoops on the multi-sports pitch. Whichever you choose, the olive trees and the sweeping views of the Mediterranean are the ideal setting for a bit of sporting fun.

If your youngsters are intrepid puzzlers, you'll want to check out the selection of escape games available in Monaco. At the Oceanographic Museum, you can embark on a voyage through time aboard Prince Albert I's famous research vessel, the Princess Alice II! Meanwhile, the outdoor activity <u>Captain' Game</u> is a combination of fun trail and escape game, and is a great way to discover all the secrets of the Fontvieille district by answering questions on the theme of the environment. There are ten riddles to solve along the original 2.5 kilometre trail, each leading to a marked location. Will you find them all?

Sport is ingrained in Monaco's DNA, and the <u>Stade Louis-II</u> is its beating heart. Built in the Fontvieille district on land reclaimed from the sea, it hosts a variety of sporting competitions, but is probably best known as the home of AS Monaco Football Club. It's possible to take a tour of this vast 30,000 m², with its unique design and architecture, and kids can follow in the footsteps of stars like Thierry Henry, Radamel Falcao, and Kylian Mbappé. Speaking of Louis-



Il stadium, this venue also hosts the matches of <u>AS Monaco Basket Ball</u>. For several years now, the Roca Team has been at the top of the French league and a regular in the Euroleague, the best European competition. Experience a family-friendly atmosphere in the same stadium where footballers play, in the Gaston-Médecin all, which is always buzzing with excitement.

If your kids are real water babies, you'll want to include a visit to the <u>Académie Monégasque de la mer</u>, Monaco's Marine Academy, which is running week-long courses throughout the summer. There's a whole range of activities to choose from, and kids can try their hand at scuba diving, snorkelling, freediving, and lifesaving, while learning about the plants and animals that live in the sea.

Alternatively, stay on dry land and enjoy the beach games at the Larvotto seaside complex. With its shaded promenade and pristine beach, it's the perfect place for a refreshing dip in the warm Riviera sunshine. And when the kids need to refuel, there's a wide selection of great places to eat along the seafront, with restaurants on the private beaches - Neptune, La Note Bleue and the Miami, and delicious Italian food from Giacomo, part of the famous Big Mamma chain. Settle down on the sand and enjoy! In the shade of the trees on the promenade, the menu at Sexy Tacos is in the very finest Mexican culinary tradition, while Bistro Coe serves refined cuisine in a stylish and modern setting.

Staying in - or rather on - the Mediterranean, here's another unmissable experience: <u>Sustainable Whale Watching Monaco</u>. Kids will be thrilled to get a glimpse of the huge marine mammals in their natural habitat! Just off the coast of Monaco, the Pelagos Sanctuary is a safe haven for dolphins, fin whales, sperm whales, and other cetaceans. It's an unexpected experience in Monegasque waters, and a chance to discover the incredible natural wonders found off the coast of the Principality.

Pool fans will prefer a visit to the <u>Stade Nautique Rainier-III!</u> A favourite with families, the world-famous swimming pool sits at the foot of the Rock of Monaco, between the Formula 1 circuit and the superyachts moored in the port. Its heated brine pool, diving boards and water slide are sure to keep your youngsters amused!

And if you are looking for a change of scenery, Monaco's location is perfect! Nestled between the Mediterranean and the Alps, it's easy to reach the first ski resorts in just 1.5 hours by car. Imagine yourself breathing in the fresh mountain air at 2,000 meters altitude in family-friendly resorts like Valberg, Isola 2000, Auron, or La Colmiane, with the breathtaking view of the Big Blue in the background!

Visits combining transports and wonder

At just 2,08 km², the Principality is compact enough to be explored on foot, but there are several ways to see the sights from the comfort of a seat on your chosen mode of transport.

Monaco has its own <u>mini tourist train</u>. Perfect for families, the train departs from outside the Oceanographic Museum in Monaco-Ville. A single round-trip lasts around 30 to 40 minutes, and takes in all of Monaco's most iconic locations.

Monaco Le Grand Tour is the Principality's tourist bus, which stops at 12 locations across Monaco, from the Fontvieille district to the beaches at Larvotto. Once you've purchased your ticket, you can hop on and off wherever takes your fancy! If you decide to stay on the double-decker bus for the whole journey, it'll take around 1 hour.

Monaco looks even better from the air! So why not get a bird's eye view with an unforgettable helicopter ride? See the Principality in all its panoramic glory, with the Alps one on side and the sparkling blue Mediterranean on the other, with tours by local airlines



<u>Blade</u> and <u>Héli Air Monaco</u>. Fly over the Riviera, from Italy all the way to the Baie des Anges, for an incredible experience the kids will remember all their lives!

Unforgettable holiday courses and activities for kids

Monaco is a wonderland of culture, sport, and art, and there are all kinds of initiatives to get younger visitors interested!

At the <u>NMNM</u> (Nouveau Musée National de Monaco) for example, there are <u>fun family activities</u> every weekend whenever temporary exhibitions are staged at the Villa Sauber and Villa Paloma. Kids aged from 7 to 12 can take part in creative manual workshops and treasure hunts through the villas' gardens. And during the school holidays, the NMNM organises special themed activities to coincide with its exhibitions, giving youngsters a fun introduction to the world of art.

Educating and entertaining are two of the Oceanographic Museum's most important missions. The <u>Ocean Club</u> combines both, as the hundred-year institution offers kids aged 6 to 8 and 9 to 12 the chance to learn all about the marine world and biodiversity with a variety of inspiring activities. From preparing meals for the animals, to getting a sneak peek behind the scenes of the aquariums, and discovering the magical world of coral reefs, your budding aquariologists will have a whale of a time!

Let the kids discover their inner performer with a turn in the big top where the Monte-Carlo International Circus Festival takes place every year! Over a week, 4 to 16 year-olds can learn skills like the flying pole, trapeze, aerial silk or hoop, with an aerial acrobatics course!

Prehistoric times have always held a fascination for youngsters, so why not head to the <u>Museum of Prehistoric Anthropology</u>. For a great family day out, explore the exhibits and take part in the range of activities regularly organised by the curators, including an escape game, treasure hunts, pottery, archery, and more. There's plenty to keep your mini-explorers amused!

Move over theatre giants, the <u>Théâtre des Muses</u>' improvisation classes could well unearth a future star of the stage! In addition to regularly hosting performances designed with younger audiences in mind, this cosy little theatre in the Moneghetti district runs themebased courses during the summer holidays, inviting kids to tread the boards and learn the art of improvisation. It's a great way to build their creativity and self-confidence.

Another interesting initiative for families: <u>Happy Chou Monaco</u> offers creative workshops for children and their parents. These workshops are very diverse and can include creative activities (painting, drawing, modeling...), cooking classes, or even gardening workshops. It's an opportunity to share creative moments as a family that can become precious memories!

Monaco is a hub for unique educational and fun adventures for children, including <u>The Bubble Bus</u>. As a high-quality educational club, The Bubble Bus Monaco offers programs tailored to babies, toddlers, and young children. This unique concept provides children from 6 months to 12 years old with a space where curiosity and fun go hand in hand, whether it's for entertaining science experiments, crafting sessions, or developmental activities.

The Festival International du Cirque de Monte-Carlo

January is festival month in the Principality, when the big top fills for the <u>Festival International du Cirque de Monte-Carlo</u>, the world's leading celebration of the circus arts. Held in tandem with its sister event the New Generation Festival where the spotlight is on up-and-coming young talent, the Circus Festival has been thrilling fans of all ages for fifty years, with its unique atmosphere and world-class acts.

The Funfair

Every October, when the clocks go back an hour and the heat of summer dissipates, the <u>funfair</u> returns to Port Hercule to light up the hearts of kids and grown-ups. For a month, excited thrill-seekers flock to the dodgem cars and ghost trains, with the sweet smell of candy floss in the air. It's a great place to spend quality time together with the whole family and soak up the traditional funfair atmosphere.

The Christmas Village

When the festive period arrives with all its fairytale magic, Port Hercule is the location for the Christmas Village and its special seasonal atmosphere. In addition to numerous areas to relax and grab a bite to eat, there are plenty of things to see and do for all ages.

U Sciaratu

In Monaco, the carnival is a summer activity. Now one of the highlights of the summer season, U Sciaratu - which means "uproar" in Monegasque - is a vibrant event full of colour and life. The carnival takes over the streets of Monaco-Ville for a popular festival that includes parades of floats, street entertainers, marching bands, and more, all between the Place de la Mairie and the Place du Palais!

Summer goings-on at Port Hercule

Every summer, Port Hercule is a bustling hive of activity with a wide array of activities throughout August. You'll find sporting and fun attractions for all ages, shaded areas with greenery to relax, and stands selling welcome refreshments, all in the very centre of the Principality. Perfect for a family day out!

The square in front of the Prince's Palace is the stage for a variety of events all year round, from the National Day celebrations, to the summer carnival, and the grand circus parade. All of which are hugely popular with younger visitors. Every year at the start of summer, the square is the setting for the Meeting of Historical Sites of the Grimaldis of Monaco, where all of the towns and villages with links to the Princely Family come together to celebrate their shared heritage. Numerous events are held to mark the occasion, with cultural activities, tasting of local delicacies, displays of regional arts and crafts, and more. And there's a special treat for the whole family a spectacular sound and light show will be projected onto the walls of the Prince's Palace.

Heritage Days

The Principality has been marking the European Heritage Days for nearly 25 years. Held at the end of September every year, the event gives visitors a unique opportunity to get a glimpse inside numerous exceptional historic sites and monuments, many of which are normally closed to the public. In Monaco, nearly 40 sites take part in the initiative, and lots of them will be fascinating for parents and children, like the Oceanographic Museum, the Cars Collection of H.S.H. the Prince of Monaco, and the Rainier III Zoological Gardens. Mada One Monaco

This gem of a restaurant can be found up on the hotel's top floor, serving a harmonious blend of Italian and French-style Mediterranean flavours. Grubers / Steak'n'Shake / Babek

Monaco is, of course, known for its Michelin-starred, fine dining restaurants, but there are also plenty of places where families on the go can grab a tasty bite to eat, in between visits to museums, parks, or whatever other activities they have planned for the day. Starting with that perennial family favourite, a juicy hamburger. <u>Grubers</u>, a concept burger bar on the pedestrianised Rue Caroline, uses only top-quality ingredients and fresh pickles. A short distance from there, <u>Babek</u> (kebab backwards) serves up delicious street food to enjoy on the move, including flatbreads and veal kebabs. Head to the Sainte-Dévote hairpin familiar to Formula 1 fans - where you'll find <u>Steak'n'Shake</u>, a welcoming diner with a retro feel, serving generous hamburgers and milkshakes.



Le Saint-Nicolas / Castelroc

Monaco's Old Town district is full of quaint streets and squares, ideal for relaxing with a drink and a plate of good food in the shade of the Mediterranean pine trees. Starting with <u>Le Saint-Nicolas</u>, a restaurant on the square that bears the same name. It's always a popular place to eat, with its fountain, view of the cathedral, and inventive takes on traditional dishes. On the larger Place du Palais, you'll find the <u>Castelroc</u>, serving Mediterranean cuisine inspired by local traditions, including Monegasque stockfish or stocafi. From a seat on the beautiful shaded terrace, you can admire the Prince's Palace and the stunning views of Fontvieille and its port below.



PRACTICAL TIPS FOR MAKING THE MOST OF YOUR FAMILY BREAK IN MONACO

Walking is a great way to exploring the city, but there are other excellent transport options available for parents with children. Not only are they convenient, but you won't get lost! Here are some useful tips to keep in mind, to ensure your visit to Monaco goes perfectly.

With Monaco measuring just 2 square kilometres, many places of interest are within easy walking distance, helped by the 80 public lifts, 37 escalators, and eight travelators.

Alternatively, the <u>bus network</u> covers the whole country with stops near all of the major tourist attractions. There are six bus routes, plus express services for getting from A to B even quicker. And there are also evening and night buses, so you can get where you need to go at any time of the day or night. Digital screens at each bus stop display information about timetables and when the next bus is due to arrive. Tickets can be purchased individually or in booklets for multiple journeys from the official website of Monaco's bus operator, CAM, and you can also pay on board with a credit card.

To get from one side of Port Hercule to the other, hop on the <u>solar-electric boat bus</u>, an original and relaxing way to travel between Monaco-Ville and the Casino that lets you relax and admire the superyachts in the harbour. The service runs seven days a week.

Finally, Monaco has an extensive network of electric bicycles called <u>Monabike</u>, which can be used by riders aged 14 and over. The popular public bike-share scheme is constantly being improved as part of the Principality's policy to cut greenhouse gas emissions, and there are already around 350 Monabike bicycles and 49 docking stations.

MONACO / THE PERFECT FAMILY BASE TO EXPLORE THE REGION

The Principality packs a whole lot of unique experiences and activities into its 2 square kilometres, and there's always something going on here.

But Monaco is also a fantastic base from which to explore the wider region with the whole family. From Menton to Nice and beyond, there are all kinds of events happening all year round for kids to get excited about, and never any shortage of ideas.

Nice Carnival and the Menton Lemon Festival in February

Every February, the Côte d'Azur comes alive with a huge series of colourful carnivals and fairs along the Mediterranean coast. Over a period of two weeks, thousands of spectators flock to see the unique <u>Carnaval de Nice</u> and the <u>Fête du Citron lemon festival in Menton</u>. The Carnival is a vibrant affair with traditional flower throwing and an illuminated parade, while over in Menton there's a lively atmosphere as the town celebrates all things citrus, with fruit sculptures and plenty more besides.

The lles de Lérins

Now this an outing that the whole family is sure to love! Off the coast of Cannes lies a collection of beautiful islands: the lles de Lérins. Each of these jewels of the Mediterranean is a little paradise with well-preserved plant and animal life. The islands of Sainte-Marguerite and Saint-Honorat are a short 15-minute boat ride from the coast, and both offer a marvellous change of scenery. Sainte-Marguerite is criss-crossed with hiking paths and is popular with ramblers. The island even has an underwater eco-museum that visitors are free to snorkel into at their leisure. Saint-Honorat has been home to the monks of Lérins Abbey for centuries, and offers vineyard and wine-themed days out, perfect for relaxing and recharging the batteries.

Les Verreries de Biot

For decades, the charming village of Biot has been famous for its <u>handmade glass</u>. The unique art of glassblowing has become synonymous with the village's name, and attracts visitors to the workshop founded 60 years ago by Eloi Monod. Parents and children will be captivated as they watch the glassmakers going about their traditional craft with expert precision at the red-hot furnace, and see the glass creations take shape before their eyes. Clearly an experience not to be missed!



Le Bois des Lutins

<u>Le Bois des Lutins</u> ("The Elves' Wood") in the town of Villeneuve-Loubet is a country park with a whole host of fun attractions for children aged 2 and over, and mum and dad too! The beautiful park has everything from toboggan runs, bird hides, climbing nets, a trolls' village, and a treetop adventure course, to keep the whole family entertained all day long!

AntibesLand and Koaland

<u>AntibesLand</u>, in the town of Antibes, is the biggest theme park on the French Riviera, and a fantastic family day out in a magnificent Mediterranean setting! With restaurants, attractions for little ones and more adventurous older kids, including time-honoured classics and exciting new rides, there's something for every member of the family in the park's different themed areas.

In Menton, <u>Koaland</u> is a kids' paradise set in parkland once owned by the Princely Family in the 17th century. Koaland and its forest of hundred-year old trees is a lovely place to spend a few hours with fun and games for the whole family in a relaxing setting by the sea. There is also a restaurant at the park.

Cycling along the Riviera dei Fiori in Italy

The glorious Riviera doesn't end at the border, with Italy a mere 30 minutes' drive away. And on the Italian side, the coastline is a delight of characterful villages, beaches, and coves. The Riviera dei Fiori cycle path runs for 24 kilometres along the edge of the Mediterranean, passing through a number of Italian seaside resorts including San Remo, and is a great idea for a family excursion. Starting in Ospedaletti, you can hire bikes for adults and children, and even tandems and four-wheeled pedal cars, so everyone can travel together!

Cap d'Ail coastal footpath

A stunning path that winds along the coast for over 3 kilometres, the <u>Sentier des Douaniers</u> starts on the other side the Port of Fontvieille, the port of Cap d'Ail, and Marquet beach. Along the trail, you'll see beautifully preserved landscapes, exotic species of plants, magnificent early 20th century villas, and historical and geological curiosities, not to mention one of the very finest luxury hotels on the Riviera, the Eden Palace, whose guests have included the likes of Greta Garbo, Winston Churchill and Sacha Guitry.

Cap Ferrat trail

Starting from the charming village of Saint-Jean-Cap-Ferrat, this walk will take you around the peninsula, with breathtaking views of the Mediterranean at every turn. As you go, admire the magnificent gardens and luxuriant natural plants and flowers, nestling between the chalk cliffs and rugged reefs. The walk should take you around two hours.



Cap d'Antibes trail

Another walk around another beautiful headland, this time <u>in Antibes!</u> The five kilometre trail, which takes two hours to complete, runs alongside the Mediterranean, where the chalk cliffs occasionally give way to charming coves, with sumptuous villas sitting amid verdant gardens planted with Aleppo pines, hundred-year old olive trees, and exotic species.

The Parc de la Grande Corniche

Perched liked a balcony overlooking the Mediterranean at more than 500 metres above sea level, 2 kilometres inland, the <u>Parc de la Grande Corniche</u> stretches for 712 hectares of greenery and hiking paths winding through the villages of La Trinité, Villefranche-sur-Mer, Eze, and La Turbie. There are a number of easy-to-walk paths, all with stunningly gorgeous views sweeping from the Italian coast to the east, to the Var in the west. The park has a variety of spots perfect for exploring or simply settling down for a family picnic, including the wonderfully named Plateau de la Justice, the Fort de la Revère, and the Cime de la Forna.



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
